I did not review the Stock-on-Hand records and am unable to report upon this aspect of the Associations operations. I note that the sale of goods and book exceeded the cost of goods and books purchased for sale.

The Association's cash position improved by approximately \$2000 duriver due to the profit from the raffle, sale of goods and control of postage are costs. The Committee is commended for this outcome.



PLEURAL PLAQUE

Phil Cannane has requested that any members who have been diagnosed with pleural plaque to contact him. He has discovered four members (all electricians) who served on LSMs who have contracted the disease. It is an asbestos related disease and takes about seven years to develop. Apparently it is quite common, generally causes no symptoms and usually requires no treatment. However, it may cause a dull pain, or in rare cases, makes you short of breath. If you have pleural plaque it is important that you stop smoking. You may need to see your doctor for regular check-ups and have a chest x-ray. You may also need to have a lung function test. Pleural plaque is not cancer and does not cause cancer.

NEW MEDAL ENTITLEMENTS

Malaysian Service Medal. The Department of Defence recently advised that Malaysia has proposed to offer a special medal of service to eligible Australian service men and women who served from Independence until the end of Confrontation in Malaysia. The Australian Government has agreed to accept the award. Defence is currently working through the detailed eligibility provisions and administrative arrangements with Malaysia. These arrangements will include an application process to enable service to be verified. After further information is available it will be widely promulgated amongst the ex-serving community.

It would appear that crew members of AV1353 Harry Chauvel and AV1355 Vernon Sturdee who were deployed to Borneo in 1964 are eligible for the medal. We will keep you informed of progress in this matter.





Australian Defence Medal. This award is for the recognition of the significant commitment and contribution that voluntarily enlisted service men and women (regulars and reservists) make to the defence of our nation. Current and former Australian military members who have served for a period of enlistment of at least six years since 1946 will be eligible for the award.

Eligibility will be extended to ex-service men and women who:

- **a.** have honourably served, but due to the Defence Force service and enlistment policies at the time, were unable to serve the required six years, or
- **b**. have been severely disabled or have died in the course of duty, thus rendering them unable to serve the required six years.

The Department of Defence has advised not to apply for this medal yet. A special application form will be designed and made available after details of eligibility are established and approved. We will keep you informed of progress.

Australian Service Medal. Some members have applied for this medal with either the clasp PNG or SE ASIA (or both) depending on where they served, and have been knocked back because they could not provide evidence for the required qualifying service of 30 days. John McGregor was in this category when he applied to have his PNG service recognised. However, the Department of Defence has now decided to issue him the medal. Part of the letter he received from Canberra states "...The records that you provided certainly indicated that you departed for and returned from a number of duty trips to PNG. Most of the records, however, do not actually indicate time spent in PNG. Thus we are only able to confirm a total of eight days in PNG. Notwithstanding this, we are morally certain that you did indeed spend more than the 30 days minimum required for the medal and clasp. As we are aware that the ships log books for the vessels of 32 Small Ship Squadron were destroyed, the decision has been made in the interests of fairness to accept the entries in your AAB83 as proof of service and to confirm your eligibility for the medal. Arrangements will be made to have the medal and clasp issued to you. I am pleased at this outcome as it has never seemed fair to me that members of your unit were denied a medal entitlement due to circumstances totally beyond your control.

Defence would appreciate it if you could contact other members of your former unit who are in the same position as yourself and advise them to contact us with the same sort of records you have provided..."

Many members would remember **Major General Duncan Francis**, **AO**, **OBE**, who died on 26 October 2004 in Canberra. He was a distinguished Sapper, and was a reserve for the first contingent of the Australian Army Training Team Vietnam. Subsequently he was OC 17 Construction Squadron and CO/CI School of Military Engineering. At the time of his retirement in 1991 he was Army's Chief of Materiel. He was accorded a Traditional Military Funeral – Federation Tri Service Guard, Military Band with muffled drums, gun carriage and eight Warrant Officers Class One as the Bearer Party. The congregation of 500 included the Governor General.




