




BLAST FROM THE PAST

This is an extract from the January – March 1998 edition of *The Navy*. It shows seven LCM8s from 35 Water Transport Squadron departing Woolwich for their new base at Ross Island, Townsville on 11 November 1997. The voyage took twelve days.

Note that the top photo shows LSM *AV1356 Clive Steele* with its bow doors missing. This was probably the result of the pounding it took in very heavy seas when returning from an ill fated voyage to Vietnam in March 1971. She lost the port bow door off Fraser Island and the starboard door was removed in Brisbane. You can read all about it in an article by Roger Seward in Dave Perham's book, "Rolling Through 32".



Monty enlisted in the AIF in 1939 and served with 5th Fortress Engineers in WA. In 1942 until 1945 he was with 19th Fortress Engineers and New Guinea Fortress Engineers, then to Master General of Ordnance (Design Division), LHQ in 1945. DAVE PERHAM'S BOOK



RICHARD McCRACKEN – HONORARY CHAPLAIN

Until 2005 an ANZAC Day Dawn Service was conducted at the Army Mariners' Memorial at Chowder Bay. The service was coordinated by the Official Custodian of the Memorial, Colonel Ken Duncan and assisted by Phil Cannane. The officiating Padres at the service were Monsignor Eugene Harley, the former well known Army Chaplain, and Reverend Richard McCracken of the Scots Kirk, Mosman. Although both padres have been Honorary Chaplains to our Association for five years it has been remiss of us not to introduce them to you. So...here is Reverend Richard McCracken's background. We'll give you Monsignor Harley's history in the next issue.

Richard McCracken was born in Belfast, Northern Island and, after Elementary School and Teachers College, he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Trinity College, Dublin. He spent several years working with an Irish Linen firm, before entering The Presbyterian College, Belfast for his Theological training.

On being ordained, Richard served in the Belfast area for some years, including being the Chaplain to a Borstal Institution for boys aged from 16 to 21 years, as well as marrying his beloved Audrey, who has



been his constant companion and supporter.

In 1972, they moved to Perth, Western Australia to commence a new life with their three sons and it was here that he was appointed to look after two congregations in two different centres. A difficult and taxing time for a "new arrival"

It was also while in Perth that he began his Military Chaplaincy duties, being appointed to the Air force Reserve as a Chaplain at the Pearce RAAF Base. In 1976 Richard became the Minister at Scots Kirk, Mosman NSW and at the same time he transferred his Air force Chaplaincy duties to NSW, serving at RAAF Glenbrook and at 2 Stores Depot until reaching retirement age in 1995. He was awarded the Reserve Forces Decoration for this long and efficient Chaplaincy service to the RAAF.

In the late 1990's our Patron, Colonel Ken Duncan was appointed the "Custodian of The Mariners' Memorial" at Chowder Bay, on the departure of all Army units from the area. The conduct of the Anzac Dawn Service then became his responsibility and so Richard, in conjunction with our other Association Chaplain, Monsignor Eugene Harley became the Officiating Chaplains for this Service.

In addition to his normal Pastoral Duties in and around Mosman, Richard served on several Presbyterian Assembly and Presbytery Committees and was elected Moderator of the New South Wales General Assembly in 1992-1993.

In mid-2005, Richard McCracken retired from Scots Kirk at Mosman to their home at Kanwal, on the Central Coast of NSW. He remained active in The Ministry and was regularly invited to preach at several Churches in the region, before leaving his retirement and being inducted into St Andrews Presbyterian Church at The Entrance as their Parish Minister.

Additional to his role as Honorary Chaplain of the 32 Small Ship Squadron Association RAE, Richard is Chaplain to the NSW Branch of the National Servicemen's Association of NSW.



VALE – ROBERT CATHER 18 September 1946 – 15 September 2009

Bob Freeman recently reported the death of Bob Cather a National Serviceman who served in Vietnam on AV1356 Clive Steele in 1968. Bob lived at Taren Point NSW. He had inoperable prostate cancer for the last three years and died at home with his family on 15 September 2009. Bob was a colourful identity within the Squadron.



He had a wonderful sense of humour and he worked and played hard. When he was discharged after completing his National Service obligation he continued with his introduction to maritime life and joined the Merchant Navy where he sailed on various bulk ore carriers between Australia and Asia. He retired in 1994.

He will long be remembered for an incident at Woolwich shortly after he returned from Vietnam. We were told one afternoon that the OC, Major Jim "Haggis" Wilson was to address us on parade. After we formed up Haggis stated that he had just been advised that he was to be awarded the medal of the Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE). He went on to say that although he was to receive the medal it was not for his efforts alone but every member of the Squadron should take pride in the achievement and share the honour with him. At this point Sapper Cather asked him if he could borrow the medal next Saturday as he was taking his girlfriend to the movies and wanted to impress her. Haggis suggested that Sapper Cather should see him in his office after the parade. Needless to say he didn't get to go to the movies.

Bob's ashes will be placed in a memorial wall with those other ex-soldiers in a park on Bribie Island, Queensland. We offer our condolences to his wife, Cathy and sons, David and Brad.

VALE – PHILLIP PHILPOTT 26 November 1936 - 16 May 2009

It is with regret we advise that Phillip Philpott passed away on 16 May 2009 from a ruptured aneurism. He served in Vietnam on AS3051 John Monash in 1968/69. After leaving the Army he carried out security work and then joined the NSW Police Force. On retirement he and his family moved to Cannonvale, Qld where he built a house and lived there for the past thirteen years.
